Why did Lim Chin Siong make this speech? Explain your answer. [5]


Why did Singapore merge with Malaya in 1963?

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Read this carefully. It may help you answer some of the questions.

After World War II, the British returned to Malaya and Singapore and ruled the two territories separately. By 1957, Malaya had achieved independence from the British. Singapore was also seeking to achieve independence through merger with Malaya. A referendum for the merger was held on 1 September 1962 presenting options for Singaporeans to vote on the decision for merger. On 16 September 1963, Singapore merged with the Federation of Malaya, Sarawak and North Borneo (present-day Sabah) to form the Federation of Malaysia.

Source A: *A brochure published by Singapore's Ministry of Culture in 1961 that lists the impact of the merger on the people in Singapore.*



Source B: *A speech given by then-Deputy Prime Minister, Dr Toh Chin Chye, at the opening of an exhibition on Malaysia at the Victoria Memorial Hall in January 1962.*

It is most appropriate to have this exhibition. The ties between the peoples of the five territories of Singapore, Malaya, Sabah, Sarawak and North Borneo have endured throughout the years. When Malaysia is created, these ties will be unbreakable. The exhibition will depict the way of life and culture of the people of Malaysia, the trade and commerce of Malaysia and illustrate similar traits between the five territories, upon which Malaysia will be founded.

Source C: *A speech by Lim Chin Siong, leader of the Barisan Socialis Party, on 17 September 1961.*

What PAP wants is not genuine merger. Would anyone with dignity be willing to become a second-class citizen? If the people of Malaya are going to interfere in the affairs of Singapore, and to have influence over our people, but the people of Singapore cannot interfere in Malaya, then what kind of merger is that? The merger proposed by the PAP will not bring about national unity, but it will instead lead to disastrous consequences. Singapore already has its fair share of problems with its declining economy, so why should we have to worry about this now?
