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# Are sweatshops a blessing for developing countries?

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

Read this carefully. It may help you answer some of the questions.

Sweatshops are factories (commonly in the clothing industry) where workers are subjected to extremely poor working conditions for long hours and workers are paid very little most of the time. Sweatshops are viewed in a negative light, especially by those from developed countries with high standards of living. Sweatshops are found in developing countries such as India, China, Vietnam and Bangladesh. These countries have low production costs and provide cheap labour to the multi-national corporations (MNCs). In return, the MNCs provide job opportunities at large—scale to their people and provide new sources of income for the nation as a whole.

Study the following sources to find out if sweatshops are really a blessing or curse for the people in developing countries.

**Source A:** A cartoonist's view of NIKE's sweatshop in Vietnam, a developing country, published in an international news website.



**Source B:** An extract from a report on GAP and H&M sweatshops in Bangladesh published in a \*Human Rights Watch website.

The number of young girls who cry on their way to work in sweatshops or hide in the toilets there to escape from the harsh working conditions are rising. A week does not pass without these teenagers fainting or vomiting while working. "Our supervisors, slap us , beat us on our backs and bully us using vulgarities if we do not meet their demands to work overtime or complete the stitching of the number of garments they have targeted for us for that day". With poor ventilation, strong chemicals filling the air and inhumane conditions , it is not possible for these workers to fulfill their supervisors' inhumane demands.

\*Human Rights Watch- an international non-governmental organisation (NGO) which pressures some governments and human rights abusers to condemn abuse and respect human rights.

**Source C:** Extract of comments by workers from different sweatshops, in developing countries, working for MNCs (H&M, GAP and NIKE), published in a popular American newspaper.

"I don't like working in the fields anymore. We can make more money here so it's better here. I feel that I will be able to send my children to our village school. I feel that I can balance the expenses better."

"I am happy to cook dinner for my family daily when I go home unlike in the past when we had many sleepless nights with empty stomachs. Our work place is safe too. Our supervisors do check with us if we are fine and need any help. We are provided with transport too. Every day they pick us all from this village just after sun rise and we return safely when the sun sets. I do not have to walk miles to work."

"We need sweatshops in this country. They make us survive, truly."

**Source D:** An extract from the report by the Association of Multi-national corporations in Developing Countries, published online 2018.

Many of these workers came from rural farms. Factory work has given them the opportunity to leave the farm, learn new skills, and has the ability to break the cycle of poverty that their families have endured for generations. Many of these workers even go on to start their own factories because of the education they had received while working in factories which shows us the miracle that sweatshops can provide.

Again, when we are looking at the issue of sweatshops, instead of automatically calling for their closure, we need to ask ourselves if the workers of these factories would be better off without these jobs. The answer is a definite NO! Banning sweatshops would definitely not help workers at all!

Source E: Extract of a news report based on GAP and H&M's response to the accusations against them for their 'sweatshop' culture, published by a popular international anti-sweatshop activists' website.

"Violence is unacceptable under any circumstances. We will not condone any intolerable work conditions for our workers that cause them to risk their health or lives."

"We will make sure that those who make our clothes, work in safe conditions and are treated with respect. If we come to know of any inhumane treatment of our workers, we will ensure that this is corrected immediately. We will do the necessary to ensure our workers are able to work peacefully and safely. Their well-being is our responsibility as long as they are employed by us."



All these suggests the cruel/unfair treatment of the workers in sweatshops that make their work life unbearable[4] as is evident in their looks too. The praising of the 'rising star' worker who himself looks very stressed worries the rest of the workers who look helpless as the pressure is on them to compete with their fellow colleague.[5]

e.g. Source E is not surprising when I make the cross reference to Source C. Source E highlighted the different support schemes that GAP and H&M sweatshops will adhere to so that their workers are treated fairly. This is supported by Source C as it mentions about "Our work place is safe too. Our supervisors do check with us if we are fine and need any help. We are provided with transport too. Every day they pick us all from this village just after sun rise and we return safely when the sun sets. I do not have to walk miles to work."

"We need sweatshops in this country. They make us survive, truly."

Since Source C supports the responses of the managers in source E, it makes Source E's claim credible so I am not surprised by Source E.

"This is not surprising when considering the entire circumstance in which the two organisations will need to issue statements to show that they are taking steps to reduce this problem and their commitment to worker's rights. This will allow the company to protect their reputation by proposing these changes to reduce the problems faced in sweatshops. Therefore, the source is not surprising as it makes sense that after the criticisms about their companies not being fair to their workers, the company would be forced to find ways to win back the confidence of their consumers and Human Rights Organisations worldwide.
