Many caregivers of the elderly have their own health problems. The		
average age of caregivers are about 62. It is estimated that by 2030, about	1	
25 per cent of Singaporeans will be 65 years and oldest. The problems	2	
facing the elderly are not just medical one. Asset-rich but cash-poor,	3	
this patients are grateful for subsidies in healthcare, but what they fear	4



Text 3

In the text below, the writer describes spending the day baking cookies as a child. Read the text carefully and answer Questions 5–16 in the Question Paper.

- 1 The small kitchen, with its forest green tiles and scrubbed floors, stands pristine, except for the granite countertops that are covered in flour. I watch her roll out the cookie dough in deep, even strokes, like the ocean kissing the beach. Golden sunlight streams into the kitchen, filling it with warm light while her soft, gentle humming fills it with love. She turns to me with a soft smile and lifts me up to place me on a wooden 5 step-stool, weathered but sturdy, so that I can reach the counters. I am in a navy blue sundress with bright yellow sunflowers on it, and she holds out an apron. I lift my little arms obediently to her and she ties it around my waist. A teddy bear clutching a rolling pin in one soft, brown paw is splashed across my tummy now. Beside me, she continues to roll, the muscles in her arms rippling with the pressure. The sunlight 10 makes the sugar glisten and sparkle like glitter, and the room smells sweetly of the confections we are working so diligently to create.
- 2 She smiles at me and gestures at the cookie cutters, which are different from Mama's. These ones are silver, and they come in different animal shapes. Mama's are a deep copper colour in bells, stars and angels, which she got from her mama who got them 15 from her mama. For eleven and a half months out of the year, they are stored in worn, gallon-sized bags with zipper seals that have grown rough to the touch. When they cascade out of the bags, they play a chorus of music that sounds like their own seasonal carol, clashing with *Joy to the World*, *Jingle Bells* and *Winter Wonderland* that will always play on repeat in the background.
- **3** But it's only summer now. And this woman is not Mama, who has curly blonde hair and bright blue eyes and fair skin that easily burns in the summer. She is Asian like me, her tawny skin the exact shade as my own. I trace my almond-shaped eyes and brush my finger down the slope of my button nose while I examine hers. She turns to smile at me and her eyes crinkle just like mine, into eye smiles as Mama calls it.

- 4 "How can you possibly see when you smile like in that way?" the school photographer used to say to me, which is why I stopped smiling in the yearbook photos. But this woman does not ask me anything like that; she knows and she understands.
- 5 Her long fingers indicate the cookie cutters, and I point at the biggest one: the giraffe.
 Mama says we always need to cut the big shapes first, and I like to follow Mama's 30 instructions. The woman nods and cuts out the shape of the giraffe once before it is my turn. I grasp the cutter tightly and press it into the dough while the woman nods

encouragingly. But my slight build means she needs to press her hand into mine for extra strength and since she is standing so close, I can smell her perfume. The scent of almonds fills my nose and it is sweet and light, almost refreshing.

- 6 The woman's long, black hair – also so much like mine – cascades around her thin shoulders. She reaches up and ties it with a long, ruby red ribbon. I notice that she is wearing earrings: little pearls, like the clip-ons Mama gave me for my birthday. She is dressed impeccably, in a cream-coloured sweater and tan pants, not something Mama would wear. Mama would wear bright coloured sweatshirts and ripped jeans, or giant 40 t-shirts with funny slogans and graphics on them. The woman is not wearing shoes in the house, not an Asian custom. Mama walks around inside and outside in Converse All-Stars that always seem to match her tops.
- 7 The woman is very sharp and precise with her movements, so unlike Mama's wild chaos that throws mess into every direction. When the timer sings loudly, we have 45 filled the next cookie sheet and the woman pulls the first tray out before putting the next one in. She begins to arrange the cookies on a silver cooling rack, which Mama never uses; she just lets the cookies cool on the trays. Soon we are sitting at the round marble-topped kitchen table, with cold glasses of milk – a little protein to go with our treat, she tells me. The cookies are crunchy on the outside and soft in the middle, 50 sweet and just a little bit spicy as they melt in my mouth. I bite the head off the giraffe, which makes the woman laugh loudly.
- 8 I want to hear more. I want more of this, of her. I know why she had to let me go last time, why she is only back in my life now. But I do not want to leave Mama, not yet anyway. Maybe when I am older. I tell her so, guietly because I am scared of how she 55 will react. But she just smiles her gentle smile at me and nods her head, her black eves just like mine filled with so much tenderness that I feel tears start to prick. She offers me a hug and as she envelopes me in her arms, the almond scent wafts around me like a weighted blanket.
- 9 Yes, not yet. But hopefully soon.



Text 4

The article below is about how more Singaporeans are forging closer bonds with their pets. Read the article carefully and answer Questions 17–23 in the Question Paper.

- 1 Every few hours or so while travelling overseas, Mrs Chan would look at her home's internet surveillance camera to check on her beloved "furkid" Coco Bean only to find the brown bundle of fur waiting by the main door. It was an agonising sight, and she could not stop thinking about her pet toy poodle which had been adopted when it was barely a year old. So, Mrs Chan paid between S\$500 and S\$800 to settle the necessary paperwork and health check-ups to start bringing along her now eight-year-old pet on her long holiday trips.
- 2 It is not easy to travel with a pet as there is a lot of legwork involved. Due to certain restrictions, pet owners can only travel to certain places and use pet-friendly transportation, especially airlines that will allow pets to travel in the cabin. Additionally, 10 besides ensuring the animals are properly vaccinated, it is a hassle to plan entire trips around beloved pets. However, for the growing number of pet owners in Singapore who are going above and beyond for their beloved animals, the trouble is all worth it to have their "furkids" accompany them.
- 3 These pet owners have declared that they see the animals as more than just pets. 15 The emotional bonds forged have left them feeling more like parents to their furry, feathery or sometimes scaly pals. However, "pawrents" and pet advocates said that despite more people having pets and growing more attached to them, there remain some gaps in the pet ecosystem in Singapore pertaining to workplace policies, public transport and pet care services. 20
- 4 Their love for their pets has seen some pet owners going all out to provide the animals with the finer things in life. For some of them, beyond the time spent taking care of their pets in terms of their basic needs and affection, they also have different types of indulgences. Ms Trina Liang, for example, has not only helped her Singapore Special, Max, to open up to humans, but she has also spent more than 250 dollars on various 25 neckerchiefs for him a small repayment for the amount of love Max has given her.
- **5** For others, they do not hesitate to spend money on pampering and caring for their pets, especially when it comes to their health. These owners' love for their "furkids" has sparked an industry of luxurious services for pets, such as palliative care, medical therapy, funeral services and daycare centres. RehabVet, established in 2019 to 30 provide rehabilitation services for animals, said that the demand for its services has grown by 400 per cent since 2020. Several lawyers have also indicated that they have seen growing interest in estate planning among pet owners, and have completed many such plans involving pet care in recent years.

- 6 Nevertheless, even as their attachment to their pets deepened, "pawrents" said they 35 still face some challenges. They cited concerns about medical bills, lack of stronger regulations around some pet services and having to rely on crowdfunding for blood transfusions to save their pets' lives in a medical emergency. Many pet owners also noted that it can be hard to find someone to trust their pets with, which leads to an almost exhaustive check of reviews and call for recommendations of safe, reliable 40 pet-sitters from other "pawrents".
- 7 They also noted that public transport options for pets are limited, and that some taxi drivers turn them away. In addition, there is little to no support for pet owners in the workplace. One human resource expert said that as people humanise their pets, it is not unexpected that some may seek compassionate leave to grieve for their pets' 4 deaths, though it is rarely (if ever) granted. One pet owner even recounted how when she lost her dog in 2021, many of her colleagues were snickering as she tried to work while grieving.
- 8 Member of Parliament for Nee Soon Group Representation Constituency Louis Ng said that while Singapore lags behind some countries in being pet friendly, there is 50 hope for further progress. Some suggestions the animal advocate has brought up previously include an animal polyclinic to provide cheaper healthcare for pets and banning certain procedures that have been recognised as animal cruelty in some countries around the world, such as declawing and debarking. Mr Ng also raised other potential regulations to improve pet welfare here, such as ending "convenience 55 euthanasia", where animals are euthanised without other training or healthcare options considered.
- 9 However, he noted that some suggestions can be difficult for the Government to implement due to the tight fiscal budget it has to work with. There are also "religious reasons" that must be taken into consideration. This is where non-governmental 60 organisations have stepped up. The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SPCA) for one has a community clinic that provides subsidised treatment, like free pet health screenings for low-income households. This has appeased many pet owners, who are also happy to see further moves towards making Singapore a more pet-accepting nation, such as allowing Housing and Development Board dwellers to 65 own bigger dogs. It is possible that cats too will join the mix, should a public consultation by the Animal and Veterinary Service (AVS) this month produce the result that animal lovers are rooting for.


