Tips and Tricks

- 1. Greet the teacher and state your name, class and index number, thank him at the end of the examination
- 2. Remain calm and collected; do not be afraid to pause and gather your thoughts ("May I have a bit of time to think please")
- 3. Disposition: Maintain apt eye contact, sit straight, show sincere enthusiasm and interest, smile:), be clear and audible, and treat the examiner like a friend:D

Preparation

Reading Aloud: 2.5 min

- Note the Purpose, Audience and Context implied in the italicised portion and vary your tone accordingly
- Analyse the Text For:
- Sentences which require unique pacing and tone
 - E.g. lists, excitement, rhetorical questions
- Words to be emphasised (see below)
- Words with tricky pronunciations
 - Points where sounds such as "th" and "ed" appear
- Awkward and Unpredictable Sentence Structures
- The pauses throughout the passage (Generally)
- Sentences where chunking is necessary
- Read slightly faster than usual, and note the areas where you trip up
- Anticipate the words ahead whilst reading instead of reading them, and note areas where the words/sentence structures differ from your intuition

Points to Plan

- 1. 5W1H: Who, What, When, Where, Why, How
- Note Unique elements
- May be from perspective of participants
- Personal Importance
- 2. Question 1: Feelings towards the Activity
- 2 positive and 2 negative
- 3. Anecdotes and Interesting Opinions you have heard
- 4. Thematic Vocabulary/Sayings
- 5. Advantages/Disadvantages (2 each)
- 6. Problems and Solutions (2 each)
- 7. Causes (2 each)
- 8. Possible overarching themes and points for relevant opinion: Spot Patterns/Anomalies
- Two should suffice

Reading Aloud


During the Reading

- Don't Be nervous, you will not be penalised for an awkward start
- Count down from 3 to mentally prepare yourself
- Read at a pace that allows for every word to be enunciated clearly
- If you misread a word, continue reading and do not pause to correct yourself
- Exercise Chunking

Spoken Interaction

Answering Technique

- Question Format
- Feelings about activity in the picture/What a participant is thinking
- May be asked from the perspective of one of the participants
- Thoughts: Ensure that it is not an emotion
- Ensure that you describe the picture early in your answer
- 2. Topic-Based
- Opinions on overarching theme
- Challenges Faced
- Common Saying
- Suggestions



3. Topic Based

Answering Format: 2PEEL + New Related Idea

- Description: Describe the picture for the first question and highlight key focal points apropos to the question at hand
- Point
- Must be logical and answer the question directly
- Look at the Issue from different perspectives if the question allows
- Be as Honest as possible
- Plan your points to be unique
- Example: Personal experience is optimal (Give date and specific details if possible, tell the truth)
- Explanation: Ensure that your evidence links coherently and smoothly to the point
- New Related Idea: Keep to the last to prevent the perception of going off tangent
 - 1. Are the authorities/is the world in general doing enough concerning the issue?
 - 2. What solutions/ideas can be implemented to engender a positive outcome concerning the issue?
 - 3. How can different people groups contribute?
 - 4. What is the root problem behind the issue?
 - 5. Why is this issue important?
 - 6. What are some problems concerning the issue and their solutions?
 - 7. Consider the Past/Present/Future.
- Providing Suggestions
- Ideate a slew of problems from which you create suggestions (see Ideation)
- Define the win-condition
- Use of PERMA (motivations): Positivity, Engagement, Relationships, Meaning, Achievement
- IFAPS (I'm sorry we need to memo this): Incentive, Fear, Achievement, Power, Society
- Go beyond the methodology of your suggestion (i.e. the framework and principles of it) and explain the method (how your suggestion might be carried out)
- Give an example on how the method, or a variation of it, succeeded
- Ensure a clear link between the method and the goal
- Suggestions of Suggestions

Ideation: What to do to minimise the awkward pause after you receive the question

- Define Key terms, vary the fields in which the terms are involved
- e.g. Health: Physical Health, Mental Health
- Contrast with other the opposition to emphasise the validity of your stance
- I.e. to show the health benefits of bacon in breakfast, contrast it with other common breakfast staples to highlight its high protein
- Tackle the question from a Variety of Perspectives
 - 1. Self/Family/Community
 - 2. Government
 - 3. Safety
 - 4. Education/Empowerment
 - 5. Emotions: PERMA
 - 6. Culture/Religion/History
 - 7. Finance
 - 8. Environment
 - 9. Science
 - 10. Ethics
- Choose Based on familiarity, information and relevance
- Comment personally on the Question: State its importance and how you personally relate to the question
- E.g. This question is critical in this day and age with the advent of technology
- E.g. I was wondering about this the other day.../This is something I seriously considered when...
- Comment on the Assumptions of the Question
- Subverting the genre of the first point
- E.g. Make foreigners feel welcome through assimilation into local culture, and through platforms to express own unique culture
- PRECAUTIONS
- 1. Do not ramble on for too Long
- 2. Signpost clearly to your points
- 3. Ensure that your point is stated as a clear thesis statement directly answering the question
- Stalling for Time
- A pause for 2 seconds is permissible
- Repeat the Question
- Ask for the question to be repeated
- Use rhetorical questions

- Time stalling phrases: "Honestly", "With all honesty", "To be honest", "Actually", "If this is the case"
- General Tips
- Ensure that you listen carefully to the question to answer it in its entirety
- Either Agree/Disagree: Consider the converse side after your 2 PEEL
- If a sub-question is given, give a simple 2 PEEL
- Use connectors
- **Simple Answers** are optimal: Marks will be awarded for your use of the English language as opposed to the depth of your ideas
- Use descriptive nouns for people in the picture: "athlete" > the woman in sportswear
- Link constantly and consistently

- Q1: Would you like to take part in such an activity, why or why not? (aerobics in outdoors)
- Q2: Is exercise for you and your friends important?
- Q3 Do you think that more should be done to promote exercise in our country

DAY₃

- Q1. What do you think the lady in the left is thinking about? (picture of a supermarket and the people looking at the products)
- Q2. Do you think it is better to shop at supermarkets or small shops?
- Q3. Some people say that life will be easier if you are given less choices, what do you think?
