BACKGROUND INFORMATION


Read this carefully. It may help you answer some of the questions.

Artificial Intelligence (AI) refers to computer systems that are designed to perform tasks that would normally require human intelligence, such as understanding language, recognising patterns, and making decisions. ChatGPT is an example of an AI technology. ChatGPT is a computer programme that can understand and respond to questions and prompts in a natural and intelligent way. AI is transforming our society and has the potential to bring benefits.

However, AI poses some risks and challenges. Over-reliance on AI may limit creativity and critical thinking among the users. AI-driven innovation may also cause people to lose jobs in the various fields such as administrative, customer service, teaching and even the music industry. AI technology can also be utilised to manipulate facial expressions and speech patterns to create realistic fake information. Such convincing fake videos or images can spread false information and cause disruption.

Study the following sources to find out the various negative impacts of artificial intelligence.

Source A: A cartoon published on an online publication, 30 January 2023.



Source B: An online publication by the Ministry of Education in Singapore, 15 March 2023.

Previously, Mr Leung (a secondary school Chemistry teacher) would review students' input and discuss their responses in the next lesson.


Now, at the end of the class, students may clarify their learning against what ChatGPT throws up, and evaluate the accuracy of the information it generates before sharing their thoughts with Mr Leung – this process of evaluation is very much in line with the spirit of scientific inquiry. Mr Leung then filters through their responses and focuses on the more complex queries. With ChatGPT addressing the more straightforward and factual questions, he has more time to help students delve deeper into the subject matter, resulting in more engaging and fruitful discussions. He says this in turn can cultivate more higher-order thinking and active learning.

Source C: An official statement by the Universal Music Group (UMG), a Dutch–American multinational music corporation, 18 April 2023.

We have become aware that an Al-generated track went viral online by emulating the rapping style of our international singer, Drake. Such Al systems might have been trained on copyrighted content without obtaining the required consents from, or paying compensation to, the rightsholders who own or produce the content.

We have a moral and commercial responsibility to prevent the unauthorised use of our artists' work. We stop platform partners (YouTube, Spotify, Apple Music, etc) from listing content that violates the rights of artists and other creators. We will not hesitate to take steps to protect our rights and those of our artists.

Source D: A cartoon posted on an online forum, 20 April 2023. The online forum discusses the latest trend in Al and invites members to share responses on tackling Al disruption.



Source E: From a report on an American news website, 02 April 2023.

Pope Francis (head of the Catholic Church) wearing a massive, fashionable white coat. Elon Musk (co-founder of electric car maker Tesla) walking together with rival General Motors CEO Mary Barra. Former United States of America President Donald Trump being detained by police in dramatic fashion.

None of these things actually happened, but AI-generated images depicting them did go viral online over the past week. And these images are likely to pop up with increasing frequency on social media. While these AI tools may enable new means of expressing creativity, the spread of computer-generated media also threatens to further pollute the information ecosystem. It is indeed a challenge for users, news organisations and social media platforms to vet what's real, after years of grappling with online misinformation.

Source F: An official statement by the Prime Minister's Office in United Kingdom (UK), 07 June 2023. UK will host a global summit on AI safety in November this year.

UK is ready to host the first major global summit on Al. Breakthroughs from Al continue to improve our lives – from enabling paralysed people to walk to discovering superbug-killing antibiotics.

However, the development of AI is extraordinarily fast moving, and this pace of change requires agile leadership to make sure it is developed and used appropriately. That is why we are taking action, because we have a global duty to ensure it. UK is well-placed to lead and shape the conversation on this because we have the right expertise when it comes to AI. The Prime Minister stressed the importance of like-minded allies, researchers and companies working to develop an

international framework to ensure the caref	ful and reliable development and	use of
AI.
