## Do Singaporeans welcome the presence of foreign talent?

### BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Read this carefully. It may help you to answer some of the questions.

The Singapore Government has always emphasized the fact that Singapore is a labour-constrained country. Our local workforce today is not large enough to support the country's manpower needs. Although technology may help Singapore to be more efficient, it will still not resolve the issue of manpower shortage.

By adding foreign workers to the local workforce, Singapore's economy can grow even faster and sustain the productivity. Singapore has used levies and quotas to manage the foreign worker inflow. But in the last 10 years, the foreign workforce has increased much faster than anticipated. It creates a vicious circle and created tension among the locals and the foreign talents.

Study the following sources to assess whether Singaporeans welcome the presence of foreign talent.

**Source A:** An online cartoon posted on an anti-government news channel about foreign talent in 2015.



**Source B:** A speech made by Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong at the opening of an electronics factory, 2011

Contrary to the complaints of many Singaporeans, foreigners are actually creating more good jobs for citizens here, Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong said on Thursday. PM Lee cited statistics to rebut the notion that foreigners are competing with Singaporeans for jobs. He said that of the 1,200 workers at IM Flash Singapore, six in 10 employees are Singaporeans and permanent residents (PRs), and four in 10 are foreigners.

"Without the foreign workers, we would not have attracted this US\$3 billion investment, and Intel and Micron would have built its factory elsewhere," said PM Lee.

"But by allowing in a controlled number of foreign workers, far from disadvantaging Singaporean workers, we have created more good jobs for Singaporeans. For every one foreign worker, we have created 1.5 local jobs in this project," he added.

**Source C:** A blogger's view on foreign talent in Singapore, 2018

The simple reason is we do not have enough labour for our economy. We have had this problem since day one, the shortage especially acute in junior skilled positions or low-skill labour. Criticize the foreign talent program if you must, but the average Singaporean has them to thank for rising wages, career progression and a competitive economy. I can't say I'm impressed with our dependence on foreign labour, but as I grow older—and perhaps a bit more sensible—I see no viable alternative for our island economy.

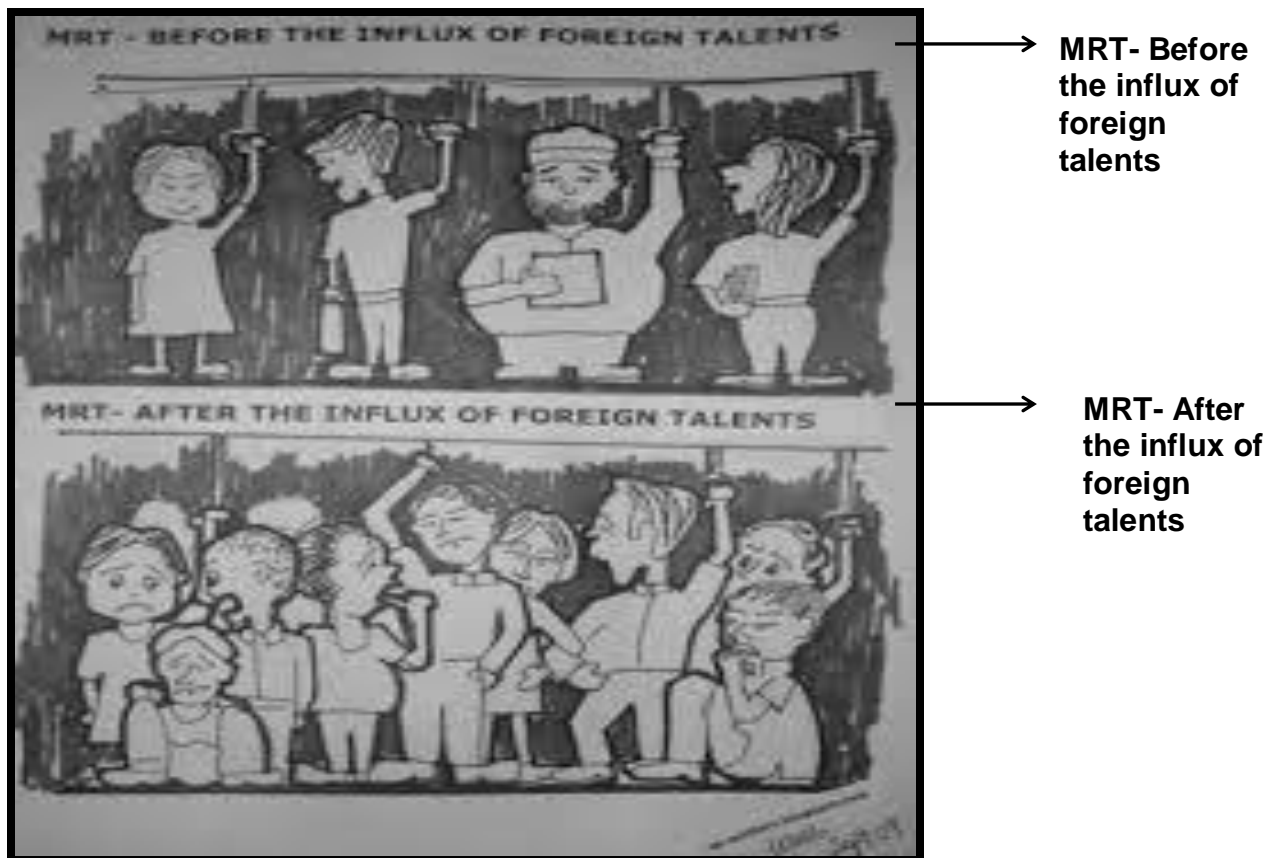
**Source D:** Comments from an entrepreneur who owns a Small and Medium Enterprise (SME) in Singapore, May 2016.

"Tightening the regulations in the employment of foreign workers will cause many MNCs to gradually shift their operations elsewhere. A number of Singaporeans will inevitably lose their jobs. That is why I am not against the employment of foreigners as they have undoubtedly increased job opportunities for Singaporeans with the investments from MNCs. Nevertheless, the unhappiness and frustration of many Singaporeans are completely understandable. Nobody likes to have his livelihood threatened. However, I don't think that the solution lies in restricting the number of foreign workers coming to Singapore. They are necessary if Singapore's economy is to remain successful."

**Source E:** Adapted from an article by a local activist who champions the rights of Singaporean workers, February 2014.

Singapore's population has increased dramatically in recent decades thanks to an increase in the number of foreigners, who now make up two out of five residents. This has put a growing strain on jobs, housing and infrastructure, and raised fears about the gradual loss of our Singaporean national identity. It has also resulted in an angry backlash, with many Singaporeans taking to social media to criticise foreigners, from highly-paid professionals to low-wage labourers. Singapore, in the past few decades, has grown economically to become one of the richest countries in the world. However, this growth has been achieved mainly by the government's policy of importing foreign workers instead of increasing productivity of local workers.

**Source F:** A satirical\* cartoon about the effects of the influx of foreign workers in Singapore published on a political cartoon book, *Diversity Singapore*.



*\*satirical refers to something that is* sarcastic, critical, and has a mocking intention.

### 2. BEING PART OF A GLOBALISED WORLD

Study the extracts carefully and then answer the questions.

#### Extract 1

In a 2017 news article, the Singapore authorities revealed that in the recent years, more Singaporeans become self-radicalised and had to be detained under the Internal Security Act. Among them, some were prepared to carry out terrorist attacks in Singapore. There is also a worrying trend that foreigners staying in Singapore are won over by extremists and supported the use of violence in pursuing their ideologies.

#### Extract 2

In 2018, Facebook revealed a widespread security flaw that could have allowed hackers or other malicious third parties to access an affected user's account. More than 50 million people are affected and Facebook has to force more than 90 million users to log back into their accounts to be safe. This shows that cybersecurity threat can affect individual users and no one should be complacent.

#### Extract 3

While Singapore has one of the best infrastructure and technologies in place to deal with cyber threats, in June 2018, Singapore suffered one of its worst-ever cyberattack where hackers broke into SingHealth's IT systems to steal the data of 1.5 million patients records. A committee of Inquiry was formed to investigate the cause of such security breach.

In your opinion, how can the government **improve** on its measures to counter the threat posed by terrorism in Singapore? Explain your answer using two strategies.

This is seen from, "That is why I am not against the employment of foreigners as they have undoubtedly increased job opportunities for Singaporeans with the investments from MNCS" which shows that the SME entrepreneur recognizes the value of having FT in Singapore as they bring healthy competition to Singaporean job market and is thus welcomed.</p> <p>OR</p> <p>e.g. I disagree with the statement that Singaporeans welcome the presence of FT as it is challenged by Sources A, E and F. <b>(students may use other sources if they pick the right evidence to reflect the stand)</b></p> <p>Source A disagree to the statement as it shows that foreign workers are a threat to Singaporeans. As seen from the source, the local man is drawn as a lone person while the foreign workers are drawn in a huge group setting with menacing looks on their faces while the local man is seen to have a "frightened" expression which can show that the presence of foreign workers are overpowering and intimidating as their numbers are so huge and it will be impossible for them to actually fit into Singapore without sinking the island. This depicts the irony shown in the cartoon that instead of what the foreign workers say "without us, Singapore will sink", it actually showed that their presence will instead create more issues for the small island. Source E also disagree and does not welcome FT as seen from Source E, the FT created social issues and are seen as a threat to Singaporeans as the evidence shows, "this has put a growing strain on jobs, housing and infrastructure, and raised fears about the gradual loss of our Singaporean national identity". This meant that actually the fast rate of FT being employed in Singapore has caused societal issues and the country was unable to mitigate the problems properly. This is also seen in Source F, where it shows that the influx of FT has caused land constraints and pressure on our existing infrastructure. As seen from the cartoon, the MRT is now flooded and crowded with people which will cause discomfort and unnecessary stress on the citizens as reflected by the gloomy faces drawn.
