Are race relations in the United States of America (USA) improving?

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:


Read this carefully. It may help you answer some of the questions.

The issue of race in America has been a challenge for the country since its independence. A diverse country, White Americans form the racial majority while racial minority groups consists of African-Americans, Hispanics, Latinos and Asian Americans among many others. Since the country's beginnings, race relations between the majority and minority racial groups have been strained but there has been a distinct divide between African-Americans and White Americans in various aspects of life such as discrimination in receiving housing and employment. Over the decades, the situation improved as government policies and grassroots measures were implemented to address this issue. With the election of America's first African-American President, it seemed to show an America that has embraced diversity, signalling a mind-set change among Americans.

Yet, disproportionate numbers of hate crimes and police brutality against racial minorities were reported, straining racial relations in America in recent years. This brought the debate about whether race relations in the United States of America (USA) are improving.

Study the following sources to assess whether race relations in the USA are improving.

Source A: A cartoonist's view on the treatment of Americans by law enforcement in the USA from a blogpost in 2018.



Source B: A view expressed by a Caucasian writer published in American-based Forbes online magazine, 2018.

I grew up in Los Angeles, in a government-subsidised residential estate. Back in 1980s, I've had insults like 'trailer trash' thrown at me and I hated how it made me feel humiliated. I never wanted to make anyone feel that way. From the 90s, new housing rules to diversify neighbourhoods came and increasingly, my neighbours were Latino, black and Asian. Growing up in that neighbourhood taught me to see people of colour as real people, not stereotypes. Today, my best friends Warren, is black, Martin is Latino but we never judged each other because of our skin colour. The rise of racially diverse relationships existing at many levels of society is something to be proud of.

Source C: An extract of a speech made during a 'Black Lives Matter'* protest by an African-American woman in New York, 2018.

Opening my shop, I heard "Freeze!". Three police officers demanded proof that I owned the shop. One of them patted me down to check that I was not armed. The others had drawn their guns, pointed straight at me. They demanded for my identity card. Apparently, a neighbour had called reporting that someone was "breaking into" the shop. The fact remains that I'm a black person, at my store minding my own business and someone called the cops on me. Is that being a neighbour or is that targeting me because of my ethnicity? These incidents keep recurring. No one should be made to feel afraid and no one should ever go through this abuse for no reason.


Source D: An interview with Dr. Randall Kennedy, a professor of African-American Studies aired on CNN News, 2017.

Are we more racially divided than before? If America seems more divided, it's because we are more aware of our racial shortcomings. When it comes to race, America is in the best position than it's ever been in history. The most obvious evidence is the fact of Obama's election—and re-election—to the presidency. That a black man has been the master of the White House reflects a remarkable social transformation in the American society. We've made genuine gains, and our time is an incredible departure from the past when segregation and intolerant attitudes were widespread in American life.

Source E: An excerpt of former American President Barack Obama's speech, 2017.

After my election, there was talk of an America where prejudice and discrimination no longer exists. Such a vision was never realistic. For race issues will remain a strong and divisive force in our society. But I have lived long enough to know that race relations are better than they were 10, or 20, or 30 years ago and you can see it not just in statistics, but in the attitudes of young Americans of all ethnicities across the political spectrum. Together we have upheld laws against discrimination – in hiring, in housing, in education and the criminal justice system – to make integration possible.
