Award 2m for description of source details on increase in animal abuse cases in Singapore. e.g. The poster shows a dog and a text that states how animal abuse is very dangerous. <i>Misinterpretation : Nothing has been done against animal abuse offenders .</i>	1-2 marks
L2	Sub-Message Supported Award 3m for sub-message supported Sub-message (answers that do not focus on impact of animal abuse on society) e.g. Animal abuse is a serious social crime that can impact the society in the long run severely.	2-3 marks

Source C states “SPCA will continue to conduct educational campaigns on animal welfare issues, and encourage the adoption of painless and humane training methods”. Similarly, Source D states “education is necessary” and “pet owners and trainers must learn how to train pets in a safe and responsible manner”. Both sources are of the view that it is important to help pet owners and trainers understand how to train pets without causing harm or stress on the animal. e.g. Both sources are different in their views on <u>whether the use of electric collars on pets should be allowed</u> . Source C states “It is an inhumane way to teach an animal using painful punishment”. This means that the electric collar should be banned as it is a cruel way to train pets and could easily be abused by people to punish their pets. However, Source D states “electric collars do not cause any pain at all when used appropriately... can make a dog more obedient”. This means that the use of electric collars should be allowed as it can be a useful training tool that causes no harm to the animal if used safely.	5-7 marks

Evidence : Lack of eye witness and lack of direct evidence and late reporting ... implying the carelessness of public in giving serious attention to the crimes and not doing their part to help government prevent animal abuse.</p> <p>e.g. Source E agrees that individuals are responsible as they need to apply the knowledge they have gained in taking care of the animals to practice in their daily lives to enjoy raising their pets. Evidence : At SPCA, we will continue to conduct educational campaigns on animal welfare issues and encourage the adoption of painless and humane training methods. But then, the onus is on every individual too who needs to practice what we teach them!</p> <p>e.g. Source F agrees that individuals are responsible in ensuring animal welfare in Singapore. Source D states “I do recognise the potential for abuse... Pet owners and trainers must learn how to train pets in a safe and responsible manner”. As electric collars could possibly cause pain and fear on animals, pet owners must be mindful and not misuse the collars to force their pets into compliance.</p> <p>Alternative : Source A can be used to Agree Poster clearly shows that Individuals need attention /help to prevent themselves from a threat to society in long run.</p> <p><u>Disagrees (Individuals are NOT responsible)</u></p> <p>e.g. Source A does not show that individuals are responsible in ensuring animal welfare in Singapore but relevant government related authorities as it is their systems that can prevent humans from inflicting more harm in society in the long run. 	<p>e.g.Source C disagrees as it is the government’s responsibility to ensure animal welfare in taking the necessary steps for the country’s long term good in instilling a caring society towards animals. Evidence : Punishment for animal abusers in Singapore is too lenient. The government and related authorities will question our proposal that it will only strain more manpower and resources. They must accept this as a trade-off for a good cause in the long run! This suggests that a cost has to be paid by the government to ensure animal welfare in the country and deter offenders from attempting to commit this crime again or influence others to do so.(6m)</p> <p>Source C disagrees that individuals are responsible in ensuring animal welfare in Singapore as it says it’s the collective responsibility of the country that will be the best solution for the success of the anti animal abuse cause. Evidence : However, government alone cannot do this single handedly with fines and jail sentences. We must nip the problem in the bud. Hence, educators, parents, charities, and every other Singaporean must join us in fighting against animal abuse and inculcate a caring culture towards animals in our young.</p> <p>As a nation, we must build a gracious society towards animals too.</p>

L1	<p>Writes about the topic but without addressing the question</p> <p>e.g. Singapore is a diverse society with people of different races, religious groups and socio-economic status or nationalities living together. Living in a diverse society like Singapore has both positive and negative effects.</p>	1-2
L2	<p>Describes the significance of the two effects</p> <p><i>Award 3 m for describing one effect</i> <i>Award 4 m for describing both effects</i></p> <p>e.g. Competition for resources is another effect of living in a diverse society. It can be in the form of opportunities such as jobs or education or the availability of infrastructure, such as transportation and housing, which are limited in supply. With the increase in number of foreigners into Singapore, there will be more people in Singapore to compete for the limited supply of opportunities and infrastructure. L3	<p>Explain/s effects</p> <p>Award 5-6 marks for explaining one effect Award 6-7 marks for explaining both effects Award the higher mark for the more fully developed answer.</p> <p>e.g.</p> <p>Competition for resources is another effect of living in a diverse society. It can be in the form of opportunities such as jobs or education or the availability of infrastructure, such as transportation and housing, which are limited in supply. With the increase in number of foreigners into Singapore, there will be more people in Singapore to compete for the limited supply of opportunities and infrastructure. Some also believe that employers have more preference for foreign workers, as they are more willing to accept a lower pay, rather than local workers who expect a higher pay. For example in some of the professional careers, like engineers and IT programmers, local employers in Singapore tend to hire foreign workers as they could employ them for a cheaper labour cost compared to employing the locals. This causes the locals to lose their jobs to the foreign workers who are eventually hired by the employers. Therefore, many Singaporeans regard the younger and cheaper foreign workers as a threat to their livelihood, and will naturally feel frustrated about their presence and the competition they pose, leading to tension between Singaporeans and the foreign workers.</p> <p>OR/ AND</p> <p>e.g.</p> <p>Prejudice and misconceptions pose a difficult challenge for the government to manage in a diverse society. When people in diverse societies interact, there can be possibilities for misunderstandings to happen due to the cultural differences. Differing values and customs can also lead people to jump to conclusions about others and develop negative stereotypes and false assumptions. These can lead people to develop prejudices and act in a discriminatory way. For example, Arabs and Muslim Americans became the victim of hate crimes after the 9/11 attacks. Many were assumed to have terrorist links and were often stopped for questioning. Due to prejudice and misconceptions, it will lead to foreigners or other races feeling that they are unfairly treated. When different groups are unable to agree with each other, the government will need to find ways to resolve the misconceptions. If not managed effectively, this can cause tensions and conflicts between the locals and foreigners. Once distrust happens between them, it will take a long time for the government to rebuild the harmony between the two groups. Hence, prejudice and misconceptions is a difficult challenge for the government to manage.</p>	5-7
L4	<p>Both aspects of L3 plus explains the relative importance of each factor</p> <p>e.g.</p> <p>To conclude, I feel that prejudice and misconception is more challenging than competition over resources. The former determines the country's peace and social harmony in the long run which would then have repercussions on the country's development/ growth. If Singaporeans and foreigners are not able to build healthy working and social relationships at work or in public, this would sow the seeds of social tensions building up gradually and leading to disharmony and unrest in the country which would cripple the country's economic stability as the government would have to divert its resources to stabilizing the country's social</p>	8

	<p>harmony leaving out other sectors of development of the country to stagnate which itself would lead to more negative economic impact. Competition over resources is less challenging as it can be dealt with by the government adjusting the necessary in their policy making which is within their control unlike prejudice and misconception which cannot be controlled by the government as it is not easy to realign public mindset overnight.</p>
