

How far are immigrants welcomed in France?


BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Read this carefully. It may help you to answer some of the questions.

France has nearly 7 million immigrants, which is about 10.3% of its population. About 4 to 5 million of them are immigrants with North African backgrounds. The French advocates for the policy of assimilation, prioritising the minimising of cultural differences in favour of a unified French identity. They believe that socio-cultural diversity can be managed through laïcité (secularism) which separates public life from religious, ethnic, and racial identities to ensure equality. Immigrants are also expected to adopt the practices of the majority. However, this has led to challenges for immigrants, especially those of North African descent. Many of them face discrimination and the pressure to mask their own identities in public for a singular French identity. This issue has been widely discussed with some preferring a stricter assimilation policy while others arguing that a more welcoming approach should be adopted to achieve harmony.

Study the following sources to assess how welcomed immigrants are in France.

Source B: From an article by a French academic specialising in North African immigration, published in 2016.

There are positive signs that many North African immigrants who came to France in search of social and economic stability, have gradually assimilated into France as their/basic needs of housing and employment are met. Many of these immigrants who followed the France's secular laws have also become tawyers, doctors or journalists.

Nonetheless, the French government should continue to concentrate on improving the lives of the immigrants such as ensuring affordable housing and employment opportunities. They should also continue to ensure access to French language classes. With ideal conditions, immigrants can then focus on blending into France even more naturally and painlessly, without the need for excessive restrictions of their cultural practices.

Source C: A forum post by an American professional who immigrated to France, posted in 2018.

As an American immigrant who is working on blending in with French culture and still learning the language, I must say the French are quite friendly. My French was not proficient two years ago and I would apologise first to whoever I'm speaking to. They will then speak a bit slower to help me.

I firmly believe that immigrants should learn and practise the ways of the country they choose to move to and to put aside their cultural connections. After two years of hard work, I obtained the language certification after going for free courses offered by government agencies which helped to secure full time employment. There are employment opportunities for immigrants who choose to adhere to the values of the country. By choosing to assimilate, I am rewarded with a well-paid job and a sense of belonging to an amazing country and culture.

Source D: France's President Macron responding to issues on inequalities in France, broadcasted on an American television programme, in 2021.

France is a country with many immigrants coming from former colonies especially North Africa. Today, immigrants still find themselves being discriminated over their differences. My conviction is to address this transparently. Hence, I launched new platforms to fight against hostility towards immigrants. I also intend to hold peaceful dialogues to understand why discrimination happens and to craft new policies to overcome it. When managing diversity, we need to move towards encouraging the idea that a nation can be based on unity with differences rather than forcing individuals to hide their unique identities.

Source E: From an article on an Indonesian news website, published in 2024.

After being rejected about 50 times at job interviews in France despite ample qualifications, Adam, a North African immigrant packed his bags and moved to Dubai.

"I feel much better here than in France;" the 32 year-old said. "Here, we are all equal. You can have a boss who's Indian, Arab or French. In France, you need to work twice as hard when you come from certain immigrant groups."

Highly qualified immigrants are leaving France. Of 1000 of these immigrants who have been surveyed, 71 percent left due to discrimination. North African immigrants and their children have been living in an increasingly hostile environment. To assimilate, they have to adhere to the law which bans women from displaying religious symbols, including wearing of headscarves and long robes in public schools.

Source F: From an opinion piece by former Education Minister of France who was born in North Africa published in 2024.

This is a daughter of immigrants writing. I owe my achievements to France's assimilation initiatives, its public schools, and the charitable and political organisations that have supported an immigrant like me. This country belongs to all of us.

Like many immigrants, I choose not to reveal my religious identity publicly as Lwant to blend in and to be judged by my actions, not my background. While doing so is painful for many immigrants like me, it is necessary in a nation that believes in equality and fraternity. In fact, with the support from citizen groups, it has been possible for immigrants to be included into the French society over time.
