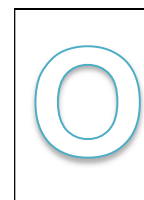

How far have immigrants been welcomed in America?

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Read this carefully. It may help you answer some of the questions.

Immigration has played an important role in American history, and the United States continues to have the most open immigration policy in the world. The United States is home to the world's largest immigrant population (41 million). America's openness to immigrants have enriched its culture, expanded economic opportunity, and enhanced its influence in the world. Immigrants have also complemented native-born workers and raised general productivity through innovation and entrepreneurship. However, immigrants also face prejudices and tensions can be felt between the locals and immigrants. Immigrants have been blamed for competing with the locals for jobs, lowering of wages, increased crime rate and overcrowding on roads.

Study the following sources to find out whether immigrants are welcomed in US.

Source A: *A cartoonist's depiction of how US President Donald Trump views immigrants published in the Seattle Times, a US newspaper, in 2018.*

Source B: Findings from a research conducted by a US research agency published in January, 2019.

In recent years, a majority (62%) say immigrants strengthen the country because of their hard work and talents. Just 28% say immigrants are a burden on the country because they take jobs, housing and health care, according to a new survey by Pew Research Center. These attitudes have changed little in the past few years, but they are very different from a quarter-century ago. In 1994, attitudes were nearly the reverse of what they are today: 63% of Americans said immigrants burdened the country and 31% said they strengthened it.

After living in the US for nearly 70 years, I cannot even consider thinking of anywhere else as home. And yet the US I'm living in today is not the US I remember. It is not the same country that welcomed me as a young man, the country I fell in love with and chose to make my home. The images of acceptance and hope that compelled so many to come to the US are being replaced by "get out" signs. Despite the economic benefit that the Chinese immigrants bring, their presence in the US is often negatively received. Their behavior is often mocked and their prevalence in the college campuses is often treated like a plague rather than the financial boon it actually is.

Source F: *A news article from Forbes, an economist magazine in the US, published in August 2018.*

Far from being a drain on an economy, immigrants are actually an engine that helps drive innovation and growth. That influx is especially important when looking at high-skilled workers. Researchers also found that even though foreign-born people make up about 13% of the US population, immigrant entrepreneurs create some 25% of new companies, and that number continues to rise. Immigrant-led companies start smaller but grow at a faster rate and are more likely to survive long term.

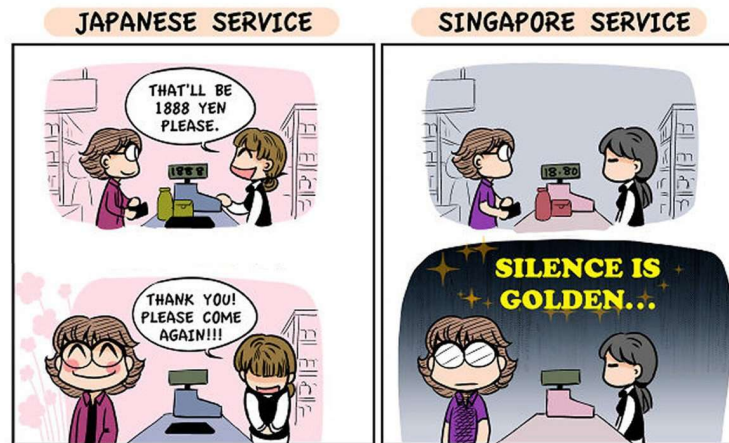
