BACKGROUND INFORMATION


Read this carefully. It may help you to answer some of the questions.

Football is a very popular sport in Italy with millions of fans not just locally but around the world as well. *Serie A*, the highest level of competition in Italian football, is considered one of the best football leagues in the world. This reputation has enabled it to attract top footballing talents from around the world, which has led to a greater diversity of footballers playing in the league. However, incidents of racism over the years have often tainted the reputation of *Serie A*. On several occasions, black players were subjected to racist chants from fans of opposing teams during matches.

Regulations have been in place for many years to tackle racism in professional football. For example, referees are given the authority to suspend a match should racist chants continue after public announcements have been made asking for it to stop. Clubs can also be fined or have sections of the stadiums closed off if their fans are found to have participated in racist chants. Despite this, sports journalists from within Italy as well as around the world often criticise the Italian football authorities for not taking a firmer stance in stamping out racism in the league.

Study the following sources to find out what can be done to tackle racism in Italian football.

Source A: A cartoon posted on Twitter by Italian Football TV (IFTV), a few days after African footballer Kalidou Koulibaly was subjected to racist abuse by fans of an opposing team during a Serie A football match. Posted December 2018.



Source B: An extract from an interview with Gabriele Gravina, President of the Italian Football Association. Published by an international sports news website, February 2019.

The new rules that we have introduced in the fight against racism will lead to incentives for clubs that promote good fans. When you feel that you are in the company of good fans and you make it clear how beautiful it is to support your team in a correct, clean and healthy way, people choose whether they want to be part of the good fans or the bad fans. Of course, there are more good fans around so, the idea of rewarding the club when their good fans turn on those bad fans, it's a huge success.

Source C: Comments by the Sporting Director of Italian football club AC Milan after a match against Lazio. Two of their players were subjected to racist chants by sections of the Lazio fans. AC Milan lost the match 1-0. Published April 2019.

We weren't the ones who had to ask for the suspension (of the match), because we didn't want it to look like an excuse for the result. The referee had to decide. But I think referees should be protected and helped more by the institutions, so they're not left alone at such moments. We've issued a statement and we'll ask for action to be taken. There are rules for intervening and fighting racism in the stadium. Just apply them. We can't suffer what we suffered on Wednesday night. We accept the defeat and reject excuses, but we demand respect and justice.

Source D: Comments by the President of Italian football club Cagliari, after a match between Cagliari and Juventus. Fans of Cagliari were accused of racially abusing Moise Kean, a black player from Juventus, after he celebrated a goal he scored in front of a section of Cagliari fans. Published April 2019.

We cannot go around calling the entire Cagliari fans offensive things. If there were racist jeers, then our fans got it wrong, but it happened because of the disrespectful way Kean celebrated his goal and would have happened even if the goal scorer had a different colour of skin. All I heard were whistles and jeers. There's no need to cast a shadow over the entire Cagliari fan base or the club.

Source E: An extract from a statement by 'Kick It Out', an international organisation focused on tackling racism in football, after Juventus player Moise Kean suffered racist abuse during a football match against Cagliari. Published April 2019.

Despite the referee asking for a public announcement calling for the racist chanting to stop, the abuse continued – but the game wasn't suspended. A clear failure of enforcing proper procedures. This is the third year in a row that black players have been racially abused at Cagliari, and yet the Italian Football Association allow it to continue. Swift, decisive action against mass racist chanting must be taken now, and that means extended stadium bans or points deductions.

2 Being Part of A Globalised World

Extract 1

In 2018, Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong announced Singapore's intention to nominate Singapore's hawker culture to be included in the UNESCO Intangible Cultural Heritage List. If accepted, it will make the hawker culture a recognised cultural heritage of the world. However, critics say that this move will not necessarily save hawker culture. Many hawker practitioners are ageing, and not many of the younger generation are willing to pick up the trade due to the hard work and low profit margins associated with running a hawker stall. If no solutions are found, the hawker culture that many Singaporeans take pride in may disappear in the years to come.

Extract 2

Given its global nature, transnational terrorism cannot be fought by one country alone. Countries need to cooperate with one another, as seen during many occasions where cooperation has prevented acts of terrorism.

Extract 3

A series of government measures have been implemented in Singapore to help detect and prevent terrorism, as well as minimise damage from terrorist acts should they happen.

Reliability, utility, or sufficiency

E.g. While the President of Italian Football Association claims that new measures are being implemented to fight racism and it is a success, his statement may not necessarily be reliable. He may just be responding because of the pressure that he is facing by the international sports community. This is so that the international community will stop criticising him for not being more proactive in tackling the problem.

Sharing example from contextual knowledge

E.g. I do not agree that enough has been done. As mentioned by Source E, actions must be swift and decisive. The authorities in Italy must take a tougher stance against racism before it becomes a bigger problem and spill over beyond the stadium. Allowing such hateful behaviour can even lead to violence one day. For example, in Christchurch New Zealand, xenophobia and racism led to the deaths of dozens of people. As such, this issue must be taken seriously.

Balanced conclusion/resolution

E.g. Racism in Italian football does seem to be a major problem as seen from the many repeated incidents that involve multiple clubs. Although the President of the Italian Football Association has assured everyone that there are new measures as mentioned in Source B, the measures have to go beyond football as the problem of racism is unlikely to just be contained within the stadiums. Italy as a country must better educate its people on the subject of racism.

2 (a) Extract 1 states that the hawker culture in Singapore is on a decline.

In your opinion, what can be done to ensure that Singapore's hawker culture continue to thrive? Explain your answer using two strategies. [7]

2(b) Extracts 2 and 3 reflect the role of the international community and the local government in managing transnational terrorism.

Do you think that the international community is more important than the local government in managing transnational terrorism? Explain your answer. [8]
