- 1. Fig. 1 shows Human Development Index (HDI) data for selected countries in 2014.
 - a) With reference to Fig. 1, explain why HDI is a better measure [3] of development than Gross National Income per capita.
 - b) Explain the limitations of HDI as a measure of development. [4]
 - c) With reference to Fig. 1, account for the differences in the values for the HDI components of Norway and India. [5]

Population Issues and Challenges

- 2. Fig. 2 shows the median age among immigrants by region in 2000 and 2015.
 - a) With reference to Fig. 2, describe the changes in the median [4] age of immigrants from 2000 to 2015.
 - b) Suggest why the median age of immigrants in Oceania is [4] higher than in Africa.
 - c) Describe how governments might respond to the needs of [4] immigrants.

Urban Issues and Challenges

- 3. Table 1 shows the land use change in the Kuala Lumpur Metropolitan Area (1984 2000).
 - a) With reference to Table 1, compare the land use change in the Central City and the Designated Growth Areas. [5]
 - b) Suggest how the Kuala Lumpur government may have attracted urban residents to settle in the Designated Growth Areas. [4]
 - c) Suggest reasons why there may be squatters in the Kuala [3] Lumpur Metropolitan Area.

Fig. 3 shows the distribution of school closures and parcels of land with vacant housing in Detroit, USA.

- a) Describe the distribution of school closings in Fig. 3. [3]
- b) With reference to Fig. 3, describe the impacts of inner city decline. [6]
- c) Suggest possible reasons for changing levels of employment in [5] the manufacturing sector of a city.
