

Text 4

The article below is about the danger of going entirely cash-free as a society

Read it carefully and answer Questions 15 – 19 in the Question Booklet.

- 1 Do we still need cash? The days of holding dollar notes in our hands may be numbered. The advancement of technology and the proliferation of new electronic gadgets in today's world is set to revolutionise how we make payments. With a swipe of a card or a click of a mobile-phone app, our entire wealth is literally at our fingertips. Invisible networks connecting banks, retailers, businesses and government agencies manage the flow of transactions, permanently altering the payment landscape. As digital forms are increasingly replacing cash payments, some think that we should become fully cash-free. However, there are others who believe that we should not move towards a completely cash-free society.
- 2 One of the main concerns of a cashless world is the risk of fraud and ironically, the inconvenience that follows. The instant gratification that accompanies cashless transactions could be compromised by online security issues. Numerous hacking incidents in recent years have warned us that the digital world is not completely safe, especially with regard to personal information parked online which are easily traceable. Technology experts argue that our current state of technology is unable to provide a fool-proof and secure cashless environment that could deter hostile individuals or groups from accessing the system illegally and abusing personal data.
- 3 In addition, many sites lack strong fraud deterrence systems that would protect their clients' personal credentials. Occasionally, when an amount is 'locked' due to a suspected fraudulent activity, having cash in hand becomes critical. In a cashless society, a victim of fraud would find himself locked out of his account and unable to access his funds until the case is 25 solved. Going cash-free causes great inconvenience in this case.
- 4 Another reason we should not move towards becoming completely cashless is that mankind might potentially become less thrifty. Numerous studies have suggested that doling out cash for purchases inflicts a psychological pain on consumers such that they are more prudent in their spending. As it 30 is, payments with credit and debit cards have already eased that psychological pain somewhat. Thus, it would not be a leap of logic to imagine that an even more frictionless digital payment mode could make us much more reckless.

- 5 Proponents of a cashless society argue that cash-free transactions could potentially reduce inequality in society by making financial transactions more transparent and reducing corruption, thus benefitting the poor. However, despite this promise, we cannot choose to ignore the fact that a large proportion of poor people in the developing world depend on cash to buy everyday goods such as rice and vegetables that are priced at paltry amounts. It does not make economic sense to host these minute transactions on a network. Besides, financial institutions may put a cap on free transactions and charge the users for such services nonetheless. When viewed in totality, being cashless may not be as advantageous to the poor as it is made out to be.
- 6 The idea of a society eventually going completely cashless is very real, even an exciting one. However, to safeguard the interests of all users, it is better to temper our enthusiasm – perhaps to be a less-cash society than a completely cashless one is a more viable option.




