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

The text below describes the writer's diary entry on his experience in a futuristic setting where the world has changed. Read it carefully and answer Questions 5-13

- 1 He watched from his window as a tank drove by. The rumbling tracks shook dead leaves from the trees, and its exhaust left a trail of smoke dispersing in the wind. Thick grey clouds hid the empty street from the sun. Curtains were drawn in all of the houses. Whether this was through desertion or choice, through habit he conformed.
- 2 Retreating to a modest table, he ran his fingertips across the coarse, veined wood and thought of a world that once lived. Shrouding tears with his diary, he sat quietly, pen in hand, waiting for a muse.

3 December 12th 2033

There is a stain upon this world, it has blackened the minds of all that opened their 10 ears to its dictum. It breeds soldiers from pacifists, dictators from teachers, and executioners from healers. The path we walk is no longer our own, it is chosen for us at the point of a gun. Life is but a spoken word, written by another. Many agree with its message; They don't require a choice. Others sit quietly, as I now, contemplating a better world in a better time. 15

- 4 Those lemmings, those automatons, they dance in the blood of all they trample under foot, calmly declaring a justice sanctioned by pure omniscience. They have no dreams or regrets, no laughter or pain. Their thoughts all converge on those which reinforce their pride and power. They are addicts of a drug that has no chemical architecture.
- 5 I see them each day: they sound human, but they are not. If my countenance were to betray a tear of misplaced pit or a scowl of misplaced disgust they would shout and scream for judgement. I have seen it happen too many times to expel the image from my mind. A mob gathers to trial the victim. They converse in a quiet, Cordial manner as they condemn men, women and children to death.
- 6 Then the beating starts. There is no anger: their faces hold expression of perfect serenity, suited more to a stroll through the hanging gardens of Babylon than to the thrusting of clenched fists into the broken body of a sworn enemy. Then they casually remove the corpse, leaving no trace of a human being who, moments before, failed to suppress their humanity.
- 7 Tanks roll by my window for there are whole countries of careless people who require judgement. The tanks will bring them freedom, they say. It matters not if they resist, they will thank us when we convert them, they say. That is worth killing those that resist too much, they say. At least death comes with good intentions.
- 8 And so, I write about the pain I cannot show, the hopes I cannot realize and the love 35 I cannot give. There is no life for me outside these words. Like a barrier of glass around my body I cannot touch that which plays out before my eyes. I talk of inhumanity, but where is my own? I am deprived of all that makes me human, like a

cornered animal. Whether I chose to convert or not, I have been converted.

The article below is about electric vehicles. Read it carefully and answer Question 14-19


- 1 Electric vehicles (EVs) have the potential to reshape the transportations sector in the United States, drastically cutting carbon emissions and clearing the way for significant climate progress. Transportation is the highest-emitting sector in the country, producing 28 percent of all carbon (CO2) emissions in 2018. EVs could transform this high emissions sector. A study released by the Union of Concerned 5 Scientists in 2015 shows that, in the United States, electric cars generate half or less than half of the emissions of comparable gasoline-powered cars from manufacturing to disposal.
- Although EVs still contribute to carbon emissions through the manufacturing process and from the fossil fuels used to generate the electricity they need to recharge, their 10 enhanced energy efficiency secures significant emission reductions. Energy efficiency refers to the amount of energy from the fuel source that is converted into actual energy for powering the wheels of a vehicle. EVs are far more efficient than conventional gas powered vehicles – EVs batteries convert 59 to 62 percent of energy into vehicle movement while gas powered vehicles only convert between 17 15 and 21 percent. This means that charging an EV's battery puts more towards actually powering the vehicle than filling up at a gas pump.
- 3 As they rely on a rechargeable battery, driving an EV does not create any tailpipe emissions which are a major source of pollution in the United States. In addition, the rechargeable battery means less money spent on fuel and all energy can be sourced 20 domestically through renewable resources such as solar panel systems.
- 4 Nevertheless, there remain significant hurdles to widespread adoption of EVs, the main being the availability of charging infrastructure. Rather than being refueled at a typical gas station, EVs must be charged at electrical outlets in order to run. Many EV owners charge their cars at home in their garage using a special wall-mounted 25 charger. However, two major difficulties arise First, for drivers who live in apartments, parking garages are rarely equipped with charging infrastructure, and installing such infrastructure may be cost prohibitive for building managers. Because regular EV charging consumes more energy than most other residential uses, building managers need a mechanism to monitor EV charging to ensure the driver of 30 each vehicle pays for their own electricity usage.
- 5 Second, expanded charging infrastructure is needed for EVs to make long-distance trips that require multiple stops for charging. A recent study by the International Council on Clean Transportation indicated that 10,000 more charging stations will be required to support EVs travelling on inter – city corridors by 2025, based on trends 35 of increasing EV ownership. When it comes to longer trips, EV owners can experience "range anxiety" the fear that the car will run out of power before reaching a suitable charging station. Surveys show that concerns about range and charging availability are an important limit on consumer update of EVs. A 2018 report by the

Harris polling firm found that 58 percent of respondents named "running out of 40 power" as their top reason for not purchasing an EV, and 49 percent named "low availability of charging stations."

Even when charging stations are made more available, the age-old question of who will pay for installing them remains. It is widely assumed that the private sector will build, operate and maintain the charging infrastructure. But businesses have long been slow to get involved, in part because profit margins remain small and governments have heavily subsidized the development of charging points. Yet the question remains: how large should the government's contribution be in future infrastructure development? If getting people into EVs is for the public good, should local governments pay for charging points in areas where demand is too low? And how should this investment compare with that in social care, libraries or safe cycling routes, especially when budgets remain as tight as they currently are?




