Similarly, in Source C, it states that "Intolerance towards Muslims in New Zealand is all the more distressing because it is wholly unjustified." This shows that discrimination is unjustified and therefore wrong. At that point of time, New Zealanders may think that such discrimination towards a group of people is an acceptable action. However, after understanding that there is no justification for discriminating against people, they would then stop the discrimination and be more accepting towards other people.

This is surprising as Background Information says that "With people from such diverse backgrounds living in the country, New Zealand is well known for its strong social integration." This shows that New Zealanders are supposedly inclusive and are welcoming towards people from different backgrounds. So it is surprising that Maoris have to face discrimination.

Source D states that "a neighbour rang to report that a large Maori guy just came out of the campus housing. This is not surprising as Source C states that "This means that for many New Zealanders, they only find out about Muslims from other sources and not the Muslims themselves. Such second-hand information is notoriously inaccurate." This shows that people are unreasonable as they form judgments based on what is shown in the media rather than their personal experiences. Thus, when they stereotype, they end up being insensitive and racist and their behaviour ends up unreasonable. Therefore, I am not surprised that people behave unreasonably.

I am not surprised that the Maori shared that discrimination is common in New Zealand. The source states "an instance where I received an anonymous hate note in the internal work mail and after investigations, the handwriting later matched to a retired Pakeha colleague." I am not surprised as it is expected that people from minority groups will come forward to share their experiences of discrimination after the attacks on the mosques as this source is from June 2019. The attacks started conversations on racism and discrimination in New Zealand and under such circumstances, it is not surprising that the Maori will share his experiences on facing racism and discrimination. As such, I am not surprised by Source D.

(iv) This information is reliable as it is a comment made by the Minister of Immigration and as a Minister, he is aware of the efforts played by the different organisations and agencies that has helped to ensure that the immigrant communities feel at ease in a new environment. As such, what he has said may be credible, and thus prove the source useful.

The source is (i) not useful in saying that New Zealanders are welcoming towards immigrants. (ii) The source is from the Minister of Immigration and thus he would be biased towards efforts to integrate immigrants in society. (iii) The source states that "I appreciate all community groups, volunteers and agencies involved in helping us make refugee communities feel welcomed so that they can participate and feel like they belong." This shows that New Zealanders are putting in a lot of effort to make the immigrants feel comfortable in the new environment. (iv) Moreover, since this source is from the Minister, he would be inclined to highlight how New Zealanders are welcoming as at this point in time, the mosques attacks are over and the country is under fire for discrimination and racism. Many people from around the world who are thinking of moving to the country and who think that it is a racism-free country will change their opinions of New Zealand. This reflects very poorly on the country's international standing. (v) Thus, the Minister would intentionally show that his countrymen are always welcoming towards immigrants and outsiders as a whole so that the international community would not condemn New Zealand as being a racist country and people would

still want to migrate to New Zealand. Thus, he could be biased and therefore not useful as evidence.

Source F (i) disagrees that New Zealand is successful in achieving harmony in its diverse society (ii) as people are still influenced by extremist views and can get away easily with such hate crime. (iii) This is evident in the source which states "He is known for his religious intolerance and extreme views and in 2016, he also sent a mosque a box containing a severed pig's head, cut in half and soaked in blood. He was only let off with a fine for his offence. His hatred isn't reserved for Muslims only, but also towards the Jews." (iv) This shows that despite New Zealand claiming to be an inclusive and tolerant multicultural society, it is still not successful in achieving harmony as some of its citizens are influenced by extremist views and the punishment to prevent racist behaviour was not harsh enough to prevent future racist actions. As such, this will lead to more insensitive and racist actions that could cause social tensions and unrest in the country. Thus, New Zealand is not successful in achieving harmony in its diverse society.

<u>Other sources that show that</u> New Zealand are not successful in achieving harmony in its diverse society

- Source C: people are still being ignorant and chose to believe information from the media rather than to go out and interact with Muslims to learn more about them.

	One way to convince Singaporeans to work in Singapore is to (i) put in place a policy to ensure work life balance . (ii) There is a need for the government to convince Singaporeans to work in Singapore as most Singaporeans are now more interested to find career opportunities overseas rather than to work in Singapore due to reason such as shorter working hours and a more balanced work-life harmony. For example, most Singaporeans are interested to work in US Silicon Valley, which is home to many startup and global technology companies rather than to work in Singapore in the same sector. Most Singaporeans find that the working hours in Singapore are long and that they would not be able to have a work-life harmony. Furthermore, Singapore is known as one of the countries with the longest working hours in the world.	
	(iii) As such, the government need to implement strategies to convince Singaporeans to work in Singapore by putting in place a policy to regulate the working hours. For example, the government can introduce 5-day work week arrangement where it is compulsory for Singapore employers to give their employees two rest days. This would allow Singaporeans to have more time for themselves and to catch up on their personal lives. (iv) As a result, they would be	

able to achieve a more balanced work-life harmony. This would make Singaporeans realise that working in Singapore is not as bad, hence they would remain in Singapore to work.

	Factor: Foreign Direct Investments	
	Foreign Direct investment can lead to economic growth by bringing in more	
	businesses to the country. (i) Foreign Direct Investments refer to investments in a	
	company in one country by a foreign company. (ii) This is possible due to the stable	
	and conducive business environment in a particular country which is able to attract	
	foreign investors to invest and set up businesses in the country. (iii) For example,	
	Singapore has been maintaining its economic growth through foreign direct	
	investments by numerous foreign investors who have pumped their funds into the	
	higher value-added manufacturing industries such as those involving	
	semiconductors and integrated circuits. (iv) Through such foreign direct

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which will lead to a rise in the country's national income. In this manner, Singapore's economic growth is ensured.

Factor: Free Trade Agreements

Free Trade Agreements can lead to economic growth as it can contribute to high economic revenue from the foreign companies as well as allow local companies to expand their operations. (i) Free Trade Agreements refer to treaties between countries to establish a free trade area where exchange of goods and services can be conducted, without tariff or hindrances across borders. (ii) Countries are keen to have these FTAs as there are substantial amounts of tariff savings and an increase in trading. (iii) For example, Singapore has signed numerous free trade agreements with many countries and such countries includes United States, Australia, China and India. The USA-Singapore FTA includes the electronics and information technology, chemical and petrochemicals as well as textile industries. (iv) Such products can be sold at cheaper prices overseas and there could be an increase in profits for businesses in Singapore as their products are more price competitive. Thus, the national revenue and national incomes will rise leading to economic growth in Singapore.
