1 How does the author illustrate that loyalty is 'revered as a virtue across time and cultures' (line 3)? [2]

From the passage	Paraphrased/Inferred
<p>Epic poems of ancient worlds, the <i>Mahabharata</i> and <i>Odyssey</i>, boasted stories of loyalty, from Yudhishtira's refusal to ascend to heaven without his devoted canine companion to faithful Penelope's patient wait for the return of her husband, Odysseus. In feudal systems, loyalty to one's lord or ruler was considered a sacred duty. Religious and philosophical teachings, such as those in Christianity and Confucianism, emphasise loyalty as a moral imperative even to this day, encouraging individuals to remain steadfast in all their relationships.</p>	<p>A. He uses examples of how ancient works from different cultures <u>portrayed loyalty as a virtue</u>.</p> <p>B. He also uses a range of examples ranging from ancient history to the modern day, which suggests that the <u>view of loyalty as a virtue</u> remains across time.</p> <p><i>1m for explaining how the range of examples show "across cultures" and 1m for "across time".</i></p>

<p>Whistleblowing as a dilemma relates to the choice between the whistleblower's obligation to care for the public good and their loyalty to their employer.</p> <p>Snowden, like many whistleblowers, believed that when authority figures transgress against ethical boundaries, their loyalty to society at large supersedes any loyalties to their immediate superiors.</p>	<p>A. Snowden's <u>conflicting obligations towards his employers and to society</u> when those in power violate moral principles (paraphrasing of e.g./ context)</p> <p>B. are same considerations whistleblowers are torn between; the duty to benefit society and their duty to obey those in authority. 9 In paragraph 8, how does the author counter their earlier claims of 'decreasing loyalty' in line 27? [2]

10 Explain **one** way in which the final paragraph proves an effective conclusion to the author's argument. [1]

From the passage	Paraphrased/Inferred
<p>Yet, when even King Charles (arguably the world's most famous monarch) finds the idea of people swearing allegiance to him "abhorrent" ...</p> <p>... it is worth reconsidering the supposed merits of loyalty</p> <p>As Josiah Royce, author of The Philosophy of Loyalty says, "Be not loyal to your buddy Eddie, but loyal to the idea of brotherhood and friendship. Be not loyal to your wife, but loyal to the idea of love and fidelity. Be not loyal to your sister but loyal to the sacred nature of familial bonds. Be not loyal to a church but loyal to the gospel."</p>	<p>The reference to famous figures/ authors which reinforce the author's stand that <u>loyalty to a person is not ideal</u>/ disloyalty may not be a bad thing.</p> <p>OR</p> <p>The author references a quote from a philosopher/expert on the subject as a call to action to the readers <u>to choose what they are loyal to carefully.</u></p> <p><i>Or any logical answer.</i></p>
