BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Read this carefully. It may help you to answer some of the questions.

With globalisation, goods can be readily mass-produced, distributed and sold worldwide at lower costs. This has encouraged the emergence of a global consumer culture, where individuals around the world engage in continuous and widespread consumption of goods and services. Many are concerned about the impact on the environment if the global demand for goods continues to grow at an unsustainable pace. A possible solution is to shift consumers towards sustainable consumption. This involves practices such as buying fewer items and buying secondhand. However, there are obstacles hindering people from consuming products sustainably.
